Parents & School working together

Home & school working together has a big impact on pupil success With that in mind, we are always looking for ways to communicate with you, invite you into school, and work with you as much as possible.

Class Dojo

This half term, we are delighted that so many classes have at least one parent / guardian signed up to Class Dojo. This is really useful for the class teacher to be able to share reminders about things like PE kit, Forest School; but also share information and photos of the many brilliant and varied things their classes get up to each day.



If you haven't joined Class Dojo, please do so as this is our main way of communicating.

Parents Meetings/Evenings

Parents have had the opportunity to meet their child's class teacher twice this half term; firstly on the first day of term, when you were invited to meet the teacher; and during the last week of half term, when we invited you to the Autumn parents evening. It was wonderful to see so many of you.

Teachers are usually available to speak with you informally, at the end of the day, or will arrange a time should you need to meet.

Whole School Learning ...

... about other faiths

As well as learning about the Christian faith and values during assembly, our pupils sometimes learn about other faiths.

Recently, they have learnt that **Jews celebrate a festival called Sukkot** - a time when Jews remember the Israelites' 40 years in the desert after escaping slavery. They made Sukahs (a temporary hut or shelter) from lolly sticks.





They also learnt about **Diwali—the Hindu festival of lights, with variations celebrated in other Indian religions such as Sikhism and** Jainism. It symbolises the spiritual victory of Dharma over Adharma, light over darkness, good over evil and knowledge over ignorance. The pupils made Diwa lamps (paper laterns) the light of which symbolises purity, knowledge and the removal of negative energies, bringing a fresh start to the year ahead.







...about mental health and well-being

Thursday 10th October was **Hello Yellow Day**, the whole school was asked to wear yellow to raise money for the mental health charity, Young Minds.

The children also took part in a well-being workshop led by staff from Reflexions, where they explored the 5 ways to well -being and took part in a 5 minute workout.

...about keeping safe

Years 5 and 6 have taken part in a workshop led by West Midlands Police. The focus was all about 'Darker Nights', discussing how to stay safe on Halloween and Bonfire Night.



Lots of learning, every day


The children have been incredibly busy this half term. Here is a taste of what's been going on...



Reception

Our Reception children have settled into school very well. Each week they have focused on a different story and completed activities based on it.

They produced some fabulous paintings of the characters from 'Goldilocks & the 3 Bears' and made some delicious 'Bear Bread'.



Year 1 - History

Year 1 were very excited to go and watch the Punch and Judy puppet show in the hall. This links to the learning they have been focusing on in their History lessons.

It was a very interactive experience, the children were joining in, laughing and fully enjoying the opportunity!

We learnt that Victorian children, over 100 years ago (beyond living memory) would visit the seaside and watch a show similar to this whilst sitting on the beach.





Year 2 - Visit to The Black Country Museum

Our Y2 pupils visited the Black Country Museum (free of charge thanks to our school's involvement with a history project).

Our little historians explored every nook and cranny of the museum their eyes lit up with wonder at every turn. They soaked up history like tiny sponges and brought positive energy to every exhibit.

Year 2 were absolutely outstanding, with their amazing behaviour and infectious enthusiasm! The tour guide was blown away (her exact words!) by our amazing bunch - apparently, we're setting new standards for awesome school visits!













Year 3 - Art

In Art, the children have been working hard to create their final art project - these cushions—using running stitch and backstitch.



In one of their music lessons, Year 4 built on what they had previously learnt about the waltz rhythm to compose an accompaniment using complementary notes.







Year 5 - Stone Age Day

On the 8th October, the Y5 pupils took part in a History and Art curriculum day.

They took part in a Stone Age Forest School session with Mr Hamblett; a History activity based on cave paintings and primary sources; and an Art activity creating a Stone Age themed textile design.

Year 6 - History

Year 6 are learning about the Saxons. They measured the ship that was found at Sutton Hoo - 27m long! They then placed the artefacts around the person in the ship.

In a subsequent lesson, they found out who the mystery man was - King Redwald.

Partnership for Neurodiversity in Schools

We have been asked to bring to your attention a highly relevant, free resource for families and carers across the Black Country.

Autism Central is a peer education programme commissioned by NHS England that provides free, high-quality, and accessible support for families, carers, and personal assistants of autistic people of all ages. This resource is particularly valuable to our collective goals within the Partnerships for Neurodiversity in Schools (PINS) framework, as its main focus is on empowering families to advocate and secure necessary adjustments across services, including education, health, and social care.

Key Components of the Autism Central Programme:

- Goals: To build knowledge and understanding of autism, and to empower families and carers in their advocacy efforts.
- **Delivery Model:** Services are delivered via Regional Hubs (led by partners including the National Autistic Society and Tribm October 2025, Anna Freud).
- Peer Support: Peer Educators—who are parents or carers of autistic people—are trained to share lived
 experience and knowledge through group sessions (workshops, drop-ins, virtual meet-ups) and one-to-one
 chats.
- Online Resources: A dedicated website offers comprehensive, high-quality online learning materials on vital
 topics like diagnosis, employment, mental health, and navigating education and support.
 The website and its accompanying online resources launched on October 1st and appear to be an amazing,
 cohesive resource for parents and carers.
