Achievements to date;

- All children in school participated in 2 hours of PE each week.
- After school provision increased with the employment of a full time sports coach. Sports clubs on offer every night for children from Reception to Year 6. These were all full.
- The Chance to Shine Cricket programme was carried out in Years 1, 3 and 5. Following this there was an increase in children participating in the Dynamo and All Stars Club at Netherton Cricket Club. A number of these children have then become members of the cricket club and continue to attend.
- Following the success in the local competitions for rugby and cricket both teams participated in the Black Country Games for Dudley. The rugby team were extremely talented and lost in the final.
- A new assessment system has been put in place to track children in all areas of PE. This enabled the PE staff to identify children who were achieving at and below in lessons. Those not quite meeting expectations will be picked up in a targeted PE group.
- We were able to hold our annual Sports Day with all children from Reception to Year 6 taking part.
- Children entered rugby, multi-skills, 4 cricket competitions, athletics, girls' football, netball and cross country.
- Performed at Stourbridge town hall and Walsall Arena with the dance troupe.
- Set up and ran our own competitions with other schools in attendance at The Link. These included dodgeball, basketball and rounders. This is helping to raise the profile of the school.
- We continued with the Pop-Up Pool Scheme. This year we offered parents the chance to sign up for lessons outside of school. These were over subscribed and enabled children from Reception to Year 6 to have 7 swimming lessons.
- A group of 15 children were taken to Dudley Water sports centre where the experienced paddleboarding and kayaking for the first time.
- Sports leaders have carried out their role well within the school

Areas for development;

- Planning for the 3 main areas of PE has been looked at and reviewed. Retrieval and recall will be improved with the introduction of golden nuggets and key questions for each lesson.
- New Sports leaders to be selected to carry out activities at lunch time with other children across the school to help increase activity amongst all children.
- More opportunities for intra school competitions to be created as part of PE lessons as a way of assessing overall development and show casing what has been learned.
- Embed the Team Teach programme with all staff to improve confidence and teacher understanding
- Increase number of sporting after school clubs on offer for children in lower school
- Enter both girls and boys football leagues
- Continue to embed the new assessment systems
- Set up extra sessions for those children not meeting expectations
- Develop awareness and understanding of Physical Literacy and the importance of this
- Join the netball league
- Continue to work with local primary schools to create our own local competitions to help children take part in more competitive sport in all years


